Latest News

The biggest news of the close season is the news that John Grimshaw is standing down from the committee having been close to the helm of the Welsh CA, ever since being the driving force and founder back in 1986. John and his wife Julie have moved to Weston Super Mare to run a residential home. Garry McElwain has agreed to be acting treasurer until the AGM in July.

Teams

2002 saw three matches played by the Welsh CA. In July Wales lost to Scotland at the new Scottish national croquet centre at Meadows West in Edinburgh. Wales triumphed over Canada at Dyffryn in August to regain the Atlantic Plate, whilst September saw Wales lose to Belgium at Genval. In the Home Internationals Wales again finished third, ahead of Scotland, but behind England and Ireland.

Individual front

On the individual front John Evans finally won the Welsh Championship having been losing finalist on four previous occasions and Bryn Lewis won the Dyffryn Handicap weekend. Chris Williams represented Wales in the WCF World Championships in New Zealand in December. Tony Mrozinski again represented Wales in the European Championships in Jersey and again finished third. John Evans played in the Sonoma Cutrer World Championship. The 2003 event at Sonoma has been cancelled and it looks unlikely that the event will take place again.

Other news

Glamorgan finished third in the second division in the Inter Counties and so gained promotion to the first division for 2003. Unfortunately we will be without David Walters who has gone to work in the USA for a few years.

Changes at Dyffryn.

Last year I reported that there are plans at Dyffryn to move the tea room to the old restaurant area next to the main house near the lawns. This has not happened yet but is still planned.

Home Internationals 2002

Wales retained third place in the Home Internationals by beating Scotland 4-1 in their decisive final match; both countries having previously lost to England and Ireland. In the title decider England comfortably defeated Ireland to regain the title lost in Carrickmines last year.

For the first time the Home Internationals were played at Nottingham, which is probably the most central location for all the countries.

The draw, which was made prior to the start of play, again saw Wales pitted against England, Ireland and Scotland in that order. There were rumours that the draw had been fixed this year, unlike previous years when it had most definitely not been.

For a while in the first match it looked as if Wales might be in with a chance of beating England for the first ever time. Chris Williams missed the peg out having rushed the ball into the back of rover having done all three peels. In the second game he also missed the peg from virtually the same place, having allowed for the slope this time!! Ian Burrige took the first game against David Maugham. An impasse ensued in the second which resulted in the game being stopped and completed the next day.

Welsh Championship 2002

John Evans finally won the Welsh Championship in his fifth final when he defeated surprise finalist James Mackay in straight games, though both games were close. John had earlier cruised through his block without dropping a game, whereas James had scraped through his block in third place having had only two wins. This year the weather at the Welsh Championship was not the customary hot dry conditions we have been used to over the years, but it was not too bad after the cold and wet first day.

Once again the twelve players were divided into two blocks of six, with the top player in each block going through into the best of three semi final whilst the second and thirds played single game quarter finals.

John Evans proved to be the dominant force in block A, though he was yet again a bit fortunate to beat Chris Williams; this time by 5. In the other block Tony Mrozinski won every game, but should have lost to James Mackay, only to finally triumph by 2. Four times winner Ian Burr ridge had his earliest ever exit from the tournament. Ian had to beat Garry McElwain in his only game on the second morning, but went down to the ever improving McElwain by 25. This year we welcomed an Australian Welshman in Jonathan Bowen to the tournament. Jonathan, who was on a year's sabbatical from his job in Canberra, found the competition a bit too tough in the main event, but managed a couple of useful wins in the plate.

The two semi finals saw John Evans against Sam Tudor and James Mackay against Tony Mrozinski. Sam topped John in the third and was on a finishing turn when he stuck in hoop 4 off John's ball which was for 5, whilst James beat Tony Mrozinski in 2 straight games.

This year the plate event was graced by new striped Barlow balls, bought especially to allow the plate to be triple banked on lawn 2, whilst the semi finals and final were played on lawn 1. The plate, kindly donated a few year's ago by Shaun Carter, was won by William Prichard.

Player Numbers

The eagle eyed amongst you may have noticed that the England and Australian cricketers have a number below the logos on their shirts. This number indicates the order in which they have been capped for their country and is in the lower six hundreds for England and the upper three hundreds for Australia. We in Wales have decided to do the same for croquet and hopefully each player in this years Home Internationals will be wearing his number. There has been a bit of a debate as to which Wales matches are considered as full internationals. Obviously the Home Internationals are, but what about the status of our matches against Switzerland, the USA and New Zealand. On a number of occasions we have matched handicaps - should these matches be classed as full internationals. My feeling is that the matches since 1997 against Switzerland should, whereas those before this data were definitely inter CA matches. If this is the case then the following is a list of the Welsh numbers.
